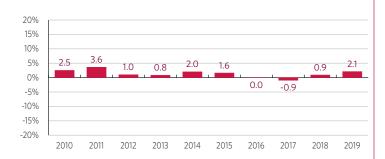

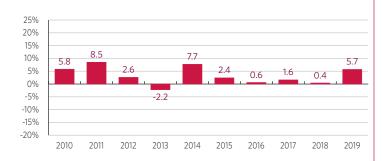

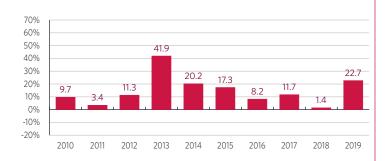

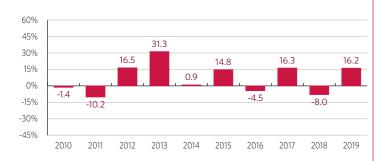

What does the fund invest in?

The fund invests primarily in securities that are included in the MSCI Emerging Markets Index, which reflects the emerging countries equity market and includes stocks from emerging markets in Asia, Latin America, Europe, Africa, and the Middle East. The fund may also invest in derivatives in order to track the index.

AVERAGE RETURN

A word about tax

As at December 31, 2019, the expenses for Class A units of the fund were 1.43% of its value. This equals \$14.30 for every \$1,000 invested.

More about the trailing commission

The trailing commission is an ongoing commission. It is paid for as long as you own the fund. It is for the services and advice that your representative and their firm provide to you.

CIBC pays the trailing commission to your representative's firm. It is paid from the fund's management fee and is based on the value of your investment.

For Class A units, a trailing commission of 0% to 0.25% of the value of your investment each year (\$0.00 to \$2.50 each year on every \$1,000 invested) is paid from the management fee.

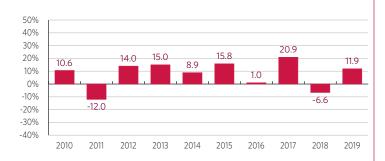
